<u>St. Luke's News</u>

Happy New Year! With the first Sunday in Advent we start our new ecclesiastical year. It is wonderful that we have been able to worship in our church building again, even with restrictions.

Interestingly, the 1st Sunday of Advent is determined by the Sunday closest to St. Andrew's Day, November 30th. This guarantees four Sundays before Christmas. The first clear references to Advent come from the latter half of the 6th C. At one time Advent was kept almost as strictly as Lent, and while fasting is no longer formally ordered, festivities are discouraged. We now use blue hangings in Advent, replacing the purple or even black hangings used at one time to emphasize the solemn character of the season. There is some 'lightening' of the observances on the 3rd Sunday, when in some churches pink hangings and vestments are used. We acknowledge this with a pink candle in our Advent wreath and a pink Advent banner. "The season is observed as a time of preparation not only for Christmas but also for the Second Coming of Christ as Judge at the Last Dav" (The Oxford Dictionary of the Christian Church)

In keeping with the intent of Advent, Noel has provided some information regarding plans for a specific programme of prayer and fasting in Advent. Preliminary information about this is in this Newsletter in Noel's Reflection and Invitation.

Information regarding in person worship:

For in person worship, masking is required and physical distancing between cohorts is also required. The church has been set up with the use of every other pew. -Indoor social gatherings such as coffee hour, are not yet permitted. Noel's Reflection and Invitation:

Prepare the Way of the Lord – Prayer and Fasting in Advent. Every great feast is meant to be preceded by a deliberate fast. Advent is a season of fasting and prayer which is both a sign of anticipation and preparation. On the one hand, it is meant to centre us spiritually in the hope in which we live as we anticipate Jesus' return. We are reminded that we do not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of the

Lord. On the other hand, on a practical level, it helps prepare us to celebrate and appreciate the Feast of Christmas which is just around the corner. I am extending an invitation to you to join me in a season of prayer and fasting. We will explore different ways that we can fast, from literally changing our eating patterns, to making deliberate decisions to live more simply. As we learn to set aside things that we usually think we can't live without, we open ourselves to the possibility of depending more on the word of God as we enter into the ancient rhythms of prayer found in the Daily Office (Morning Payer, Evening Prayer, etc.). More information is to come. In the meantime, I recommend the book "The Compete Guide to Fasting" by Jason Fung, M.D. while it does mention spiritual practices and traditions of fasting, it is not a spiritual guide. It is a practical guide to the mechanics of fasting. It is very helpful in dispelling myths and misinformation about fasting as it recommends numerous patterns and schedules and explaining their benefits. It offers encouragement that enables readers to confidently enter into times of fasting. For a spiritual exploration of the benefits of simplicity, I recommend "Abundant Simplicity: Discovering the Unhurried Rhythms of Grace" by Jan Johnson. It explores choices we can make regarding resources like time, energy, and money, and how these decisions can energize our connection with God, or be lifedraining and separate us from God. In each chapter the author provides small experiments with simplicity as well as questions for discussion or reflection to get you started. While we have a wealth of resources available to us in our prayer books to guide in the use of the Daily Office, for those of you who are tech savvy and love your apps, I recommend the Daily Prayer app from the Church of England. It provides daily office lectionary readings and presents complete services for the various times of day. with variations for the days of the week. It's kind of like an automatic prayer book.

PWRDF's Advent Resource:

Ideal for personal prayer or group study, *Thread of Hope* ties together a diverse array of writers, viewpoints and activities suitable for adults and youth alike. Each week of Advent begins with an illustration and scripture passage that takes us through the

familiar Advent story, from the angel messengers and the journey to Bethlehem, to the shepherds responding to the call and the birth of Jesus.

- Sundays you'll read a reflection from a PWRDF partner, volunteer or staff member, followed by a guided meditation from Rev. Cheryl Barker (read or listen!).
- During the week, a different writer will reflect on a scripture passage and offer a prayer for each day, followed by a PWRDF story.

Events of interest:

Against the Grain Theatre is an award-winning Canadian opera company committed to revitalizing the operatic art form by presenting an eclectic array of musical works in unconventional spaces and innovative ways. They are presenting two on line events that may be of interest to you. The first is a production of Mozart's *Requiem*. The first broadcast of this production was on November 27th, but is available for viewing until May 27th.

The second production coming up is called *Messiah/Complex*. It has the familiar music of Handel's *Messiah* and is being made available for viewing from December 12th to January 9th. This was first presented earlier this year and was shown worldwide and received high praise. Elizabeth and I watched it and it is really well done and worth watching. It is performed by Canadian artists filmed in their own locale as it was produced during the pandemic and the artists could not be together. Flower Calendar and Memorial Dedications:

Around the Parish:

Secret Prayer Sisters:

A number of women in the Parish participated in a match in the fall of 2019. At that time each lady joined by filling in a 'Get to Know Me' sheet. Each lady was then matched to one of the other participants and was asked to pray daily for this person, remember her frequently with words of encouragement and occasionally have a small gift for her. At the same time another Secret Prayer Sister was holding her in prayer. It is a very powerful responsibility to continually pray for another and quite humbling to know the same is happening for you.

Originally the match was for 18 months but Covid came along and we were unable to join together to Reveal who our matches were. Finally, a week ago we were able gather in the church hall, following Covid protocols, and Reveal who it was who was praying for us. People felt that this created a bond during a time when we did not have opportunity to see one another. It was special to have this 3 way connection keeping us a little bit closer together.
