

It has been a difficult week. I suspect that everyone has been thinking about the shooting in Uvalde, Texas. This following so closely on the killing of shoppers in Buffalo. Following these there have been 11 reported mass shootings in the US over their Memorial Day long weekend. It always seems that the killing of children is so much worse. There are always questions about why a loving God lets this happen. This has brought me back to a book I had not looked at in some time, *When Bad Things Happen to Good People* by Rabbi Harold Kushner. It is well worth getting a copy and reading or re-reading it. The bottom line is that God does not cause these things to happen, but that God is grieving with us and helps us respond. Rabbi Kushner says "..the ability to forgive and the ability to love are the weapons God has given us to enable us to live fully, bravely, and meaningfully in this less-than-perfect world."

Monday morning, I listened to *The Current* on CBC radio. They had a reporter in Uvalde who very respectfully interviewed people in that city. She interviewed the Roman Catholic priest who also said that he had no answers for the grieving but could only grieve with them and support them. The programme ended with at least a 3 minute clip of the congregation of the Episcopal church in Ulvade the Taizé hymn 'Come and fill our hearts with your peace' (402 in our hymn book), at a memorial service in their church last Thursday. Reflections on Provincial Synod:

The Ecclesiastical Province of Rupert's Land Synod 50th Session of Synod Prince Albert, Saskatchewan

April 28 to May 1, 2022

Noel's Reflection:

I am grateful to have attended Provincial Synod in Prince Albert as a Clergy Delegate for the Diocese of Calgary. I am doubly grateful in that I was able to attend this event with my daughter, Hannah, who attended as the Youth Delegate for our diocese. The theme for the gathering was Truth and Reconciliation: Our Journey Toward Freedom in Christ. This theme lay at the heart of most of the work we engaged in together. While some of the work such as canon revision was tedious, many things that we did were inspiriting in that they spoke of our collective desire for healing for Indigenous Anglicans and the healing of their relationship with the non-indigenous parts of the Anglican Church. We had many opportunities to hear from First Nation, Inuit, and Metis Anglicans from across the Province. While their pain and grief was evident, what really stood out was their grace and their desire to journey together with us as equals in the work of the Church. It was humbling, to say the least.

One work which we started at this synod was to start the process of renaming the Ecclesiastical Province. The current name, Rupert's Land, refers to Prince Rupert of the Rhine, one-time Governor of the Hudson's Bay Company. This name has come to represent the one-sidedness of the historic relationship between Indigenous peoples and Europeans, both at the time of the founding of the HBC and in the time since. We agreed that a new name should be one that acknowledges our connections with each other and our equality as Children of God. We did not settle on the exact wording of the new name but we know it will have something to do with us all inhabiting lands that are touched by the Northern Lights.

One of the highlights of this gathering was the visit of the Archbishop of Canterbury, The Most Reverend Justin Welby. The Archbishop's life work has been in the area of reconciliation and his particular gifts were evident both in his address to the Synod and in his powerful sermon during the closing worship at St. Alban's Cathedral. His presence and his humility served as powerful symbols of the reconciliation that was at work in our time together. The Indigenous delegates, and other Indigenous community

leaders responded to his graciousness with a powerful graciousness of their own. It was moving and inspiring. The thought of what I witnessed there still causes me to get tears in my eyes. This work continues and I am honoured and humbled to be a part of it. In closing, just a few notes of interest: Our bishop, Archbishop Greg Kerr-Wilson, was re-elected Metropolitan for another six-year term. Hannah was appointed to the Executive Council of the Ecclesiastical Province of Rupert's Land, and I was elected to the Provincial Court.**

Hannah's Reflection:

<u>Provincial Synod Reflection - The Youth Perspective</u>

Getting to represent the youth of the diocese at Provincial Synod is a privilege that is sadly underutilized. Even out of the ten dioceses represented at Synod, only five had youth delegates. After talking with the other youth delegates, we recognized that the absence of half the potential youth delegates reflects the current youth situation in all our dioceses. That led us to ask: how do we make the Anglican Church attractive to young people?

Fortunately, the answer was given to us in the theme of this year's Synod: "Truth and Reconciliation: Our Journey Toward Freedom in Christ." The youth of today are some of the most active in demanding change. They want to see a better world and a future where peace, hope, and love are at the centre of every action and conversation. They want to see healing. They want to see the earth healed. They want to see generations of pain healed. Doesn't the Church share that passion and desire?

The Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, spoke of what reconciliation means. As Christians, we are reconciled to God through the death of Jesus Christ. The love that God has for us is overabundant. There is so much love that it overflows from us into the world. To be like Jesus in our world today means we are reconciled reconcilers. This is the same cry that so many young people have today. Recognizing that the Church shares their concerns and has a way forward is the first step in engaging with youth. That is why I am running the Difference Course, which Archbishop Welby created. I plan to open it up and offer it to all generations later this year so we can all connect and reimagine a world where reconciliation is our focus. When the youth see that they are not alone in their hopes and dreams of the future, I believe they will be more active in our churches than ever before.

Tower Conservation:

Starting in about a week you will see some changes around the exterior of the church. We will be having Shawn Thibault of Ravenstone Conservation start the second phase of our tower conservation project. This will involve scaffolding and covering of the tower for part of the time. This will impact our access to the church. Access will be through the hall doors. We appreciate that this may create problems for those with mobility issues and we hope to be able to provide help entering the church for those needing it.

Front Doors:

You may have notice that the front doors of the church are showing signs of wear and tear. We are looking at options for replacement on these doors. Part of this process will be the removing of the veneer in the archway over the doors, which will expose the original wood. It may be possible to refinish this to its original state.
