In June we will be celebrating Ascension Sunday, Ascension Day being May 29th, Pentecost and Trinity Sunday. After Pentecost we enter the long period of 'After Pentecost'. You may sometimes hear it referred to as 'Ordinary Time'. It will last this year until November 29th, with November 30th being the First Sunday in Advent. During this time the liturgical colour is green, unless there is a special observance, such as Trinity Sunday, on one of the Sundays. It is also beginning of the summer season for the church. Here in Canada, and in many other parts of the world, the regular activities of the Parish are put on hold until the fall. It also is a time of reduced attendance at church, often because people are on holiday, or just away for the weekend. As noted further on in the Newsletter, it is important that regular giving continue. The cost of utilities tends to be less, but the regular expenses of the church continue. If you are travelling, remember that other places have Sunday services. and it can be very interesting to experience something that will be the same liturgy, but perhaps presented differently. You can either google 'Anglican church in', or if it is a small community drive around until you find a church. Hopefully they have updated their service time notice! (Items for the July Newsletter should be submitted by June 23rd)

As we head towards the halfway point of the year, our finances are doing a little better than we expected. We have both received a little more than we anticipated receiving, and have spent a little less than we anticipated spending, leaving us about \$4600.00 ahead of our projected deficit as of the end of April. We are still in the thick of it, and will still need to dip into our reserves at some point in order to stay in the black, but this is encouraging news. As we consider the current state of things, I want to highlight two factors that have kept us ahead in the first half of this year.

First, in terms of our spending, I think it is worthwhile to point out that we have saved about \$2500.00 this year thanks to Joan Williams's desire to serve as our office administrator on a volunteer basis. This gift of her time has enabled us to keep things running smoothly while simultaneously cutting our expenses. We are heartily grateful for the work she does here, largely behind the scenes.

Second, in terms of your giving, I want to draw your attention to a couple of trends that seem to be developing right now. Over the first four months of the year, monthly donations were both a little *higher* and a little *more predictable* than the previous two years. While there are probably a few factors that contribute to these trends, one thing I think they suggest is that the folks who have joined our community over the past year are feeling at home here, and are looking for ways to take part in the work of their new community. And that gets me excited.

Back at our Annual Meeting of Parishioners, we put forward a set of five strategies aimed at reducing our operating deficit over the next few years. One of

those strategies centres on our practice of hospitality towards everyone who might pop into St. Luke's on a Sunday morning. If I'm right that these trends in giving demonstrate a growing sense of home among folks who are newer to St. Luke's, then I think we are on the right track with this one. And so I want to encourage you to keep at it: keep saying good morning, keep asking questions, keep inviting for coffee—keep showing hospitality, and so welcome our neighbours into God's life here at St. Luke's.

Finally, as we head into the summertime, I want to invite you to consider the method by which you give to St. Luke's. Pre-authorized monthly giving and options for giving electronically can help ensure that our summer holidays don't get in the way of our practice of financial stewardship. It's easy to sign up for automatic monthly withdrawals by either filling out the form located at the back of the church (the greeters or one of the wardens can get you one), or by scanning the QR code on the electronic giving pew cards. These cards also give instructions for how you can donate via e transfer (don't worry, no one will make a stink about you pulling out your phone during the offertory hymn). My thanks to all of you who give your time, your resources, and your skills to the work of God at St. Luke's. I'm so glad to be in this together.

Around the Hall:

As was noted last month, repairs to the foundation/wall at the bottom of the basement stairs were required. This has now been done. They reinforced the foundation from the outside by digging down and pouring more concrete. They then put in metal bracing to hold up the ceiling joists that were beginning to sag because of the crumbling foundation. They determined that the foundation wall itself below the upper section was still in good condition in spite of some surface crumbling. Because of this, they were able to bolt the metal support to the existing wall. They felt that the rest of the wall down the stairs was in good condition and made some suggestions about what could be done to make it look better. The cost for this, which came in less than the original quote, was paid from the Building fund with a generous donation from the Men's group.

In the first quarter of every year, the good folks down at the Diocese ask each parish to fill out what's called a *Missional Footprint Document*. This document, which we usually discus as Corporation with input from Council, is meant to help parishes reflect on how they have impacted the world around them in the previous year, and to plan for how they will do so in the coming year. It's one of those things that would be very easy to fill out, send off, and promptly forget about. But it's also one of those things that, if taken seriously, could become a helpful tool for refining our current practice, and stimulating the development of new ways of engaging our city.

One way we hope to use this tool more effectively this year is by sharing some of the plans we've put together with you. In the spirit of brevity, we will skip all the reflection and conversation that went on behind the scenes, and will focus on describing a handful of strategies that will be put in place over the course of this year. 
